We met with them and they were very happy I chose them to donate to and reassured me that my money would be used to buy things the kids needed. In fact, when I would deliver my donation check, often times the CFO would ask how I wanted them to spend that money. If it were close to school starting, I asked for school supplies or clothes. If it was Christmas or someone's birthday, toys were good because I know some kids don't have a lot.

When I was getting close to my third anniversary in business, I decided there were kids in other situations that could probably use my help. I've been very lucky and have never been hospitalized but some kids have to stay in hospitals for weeks and even months. I set up a program with Rady Children's Hospital in San Diego, CA to distribute gift bags full of activity supplies so they would have something to do. A portion of every sale is used to buy things to fill the bags. My parents and I put everything together and even though I can't give them to the kids personally because of hospital age restrictions, I know they will make a lot of kids happy.

Whatever you decide to do in life, whether you start your own business or work for someone else, think about ways you can help others. If you're still a kid, start now. It really makes you feel good to know you're helping. Even if it's in a small way, it still matters.
